use some idioms are commonly used and 01:23

others are not so my advice to you when 01:27

you're learning idioms is not to use a 01:30

huge long list of hundreds and hundreds 01:33

of idioms in this lesson I'm going to 01:35

share with you a few idioms that I use

all the time almost every day and all of 01:43

these idioms are to do with food ready 01:46

let's try them out to put all of your

01:50

eggs in one basket

01:53

now this idiom is used to describe when 01:57

you risk everything at once and it

usually relates to money or opportunity 02:04

or hopes for the future and it's based 02:09

on the idea that if you drop the basket 02:11

that's full of eggs

02:13

you'll lose everything perhaps it's a 02:17

better idea to put your eggs in a few 02:19

different baskets so that if you drop 02:22

one you'll still have some others for 02:27

example while my brother trained to be a 02:30

professional footballer he also studied 02:33

a degree in engineering because my dad 02:37

told him not to put all of his eggs in 02:39

one basket or my uncle invested all of 02:46

his savings into a company that went 02:49

bankrupt I don't know why he put all of 02:52

his eggs in one basket to be in a pickle

we use this idiom when we're in a 02:59

difficult situation or we have a problem

and it's often said to be in a bit of a

pickle especially when it's not a

03:10

serious problem and you want to make it 03:13

seem less serious than it really is I'm

03:16

in a bit of a pickle for example we're

03:20

in a pickle

03:21

we've just locked the keys in the car or 03:25

I promise to pick up my sister from the 03:29

airport but I'm still at work and I

03:32

can't leave yet I'm in a bit of a pickle

can you help to buy it off more than one 03:39

can chew this is one of my favourite 03:42

ones it's when you try to do something 03:45

that is too difficult for you and you're 03:47

not able to do it maybe you don't have

the skills or you don't have the time to 03:52

make sure that you can do it for example

he's been working back late every night

this week trying to finish the project

04:01

I think he's bitten off more than he can 04:03

chew or I'm so sorry I haven't got time

to meet you for lunch today I'm

04:10

organizing my sister's surprise party

and I've bitten off more than I can chew 04:14

there's so much to do another good one 04:19

to butter someone up now this idiom

04:23

means that you be really nice or

04:25

friendly to some

04:27

so that you can get something from them

you want them to do something for you so 04:32

you're very nice to them you're

04:34

buttering them up have you ever cooked 04:37

your mum a really nice meal or maybe

taking her out for dinner and then asked

her if you could borrow some money 04:47

then you've buttered her up here are

some more examples I know that Paul has

a spare ticket to the concert

04:56

perhaps if we butter him up he might

offer it to us or he'll have to butter

his boss up if he wants to take extra 05:06

leave at Christmas in a nutshell

now this idiom is used to show that 05:13

you're talking about something or 05:15

describing something in a really simple

way you're not using many words you're

trying to be as clear and as simple as <sup>05:24</sup>

possible for example your friend asked 05:29

you about a movie that you saw in the <sup>05:31</sup>

weekend and you answer well it's a 05:35

complicated story but in a nutshell it's <sup>05:39</sup>

about three astronauts who disappear for <sup>05:43</sup>

about 30 years before returning to earth 05:46

with no memory of anything that had

happened another example I don't want to 05:53

explain their whole history but in a 05:56

nutshell they just wanted different 05:57

things out of life she wanted travel an 06:00

adventure he wanted to focus on his

career so in the end they broke up it's 06:07

really sad so they are my favourite
