action that started in the past and is 01:30

still in progress for example I've been 01:36

studying all morning I've been doing the 01:41

exercises since 11 o'clock. He has been 01:46

driving for 5 hours. Let's look at some 01:52

examples of the present perfect and how 01:56

they're different from the ones you've 01:59

just looked at. So the present perfect 02:03

refers to a completed action an action

that's complete at the time of speaking & 02:10

it's not going on anymore.

Look at the first example I've studied

three sections until now. Let's look at

02:22

the two sentences together so I've been  $_{\scriptscriptstyle 02:26}$ 

studying all morning that means you 02:30

started this morning and you're still 02:33

studying within this time you have

completed you have finished three 02:40

sections. Now this is present perfect 02:45

I've studied three sections until now 02:49

next example I've already done half of 02:55

the exercises let's look at the present 02:59

perfect continuous I've been doing the 03:03

exercises since 11 so you started at 11 03:07

and you're still doing the exercises but 03:12

within this time you have already 03:14

finished half of them - present perfect

I've already done half of the exercises

and the last example he has driven 500 03:29

kilometres so far. Look at the continuous

form he has been driving for 5 hours. He

is still driving within this time he has 03:46

completed 500 kilometers of driving by 03:52

the way so far is a synonym for until 03:55

now. Let's look at the time lines. Now to 04:01

make it perfectly clear for you what the 04:03

difference is between the two tenses are.

continuous action that started in the

past, has been going on until now it's

still going on and will go on for a

Remember that you can refer to this

tense with these two words "since" and "for"

"Since" indicates the exact time that the

action started in the past and "for" tells

us how long the action has been going on.

that it will look very very different.

it's a completed action at some point in 05:03

the past we don't know exactly when or 05:06

we don't want to say exactly when. What's 05:10

important is that the action is complete 05:13

now at the time of speaking. Right then, 05:23

let's look at some common mistakes you

may say or hear I have waited for half 05:31

an hour because you're still waiting. The 05:36

action is still going on you should use 05:39

the present perfect continuous I have 05:43

been waiting for half an hour the action <sup>05:47</sup>

is not complete yet. Let's look at

05:52

another example you may hear or say he

has slept since 9 o'clock once again

because the action is going on is still

06:06

in progress he is still sleeping we

06:10

should be using the present perfect

06:12

continuous he has been sleeping since 9 06:16

o'clock sometimes you may make the

06:21

reverse mistake, for example, you may hear

06:25

or say it has been snowing twice this

06:29

week.

06:30

Now the word twice means 2 times

06:35

indicates - finished completed actions

06:39

it's

06:41

not once stopped, it snowed again and <sup>06:44</sup>

stopped it's not snowing at the moment.

Therefore we need to use the present

perfect it has snowed twice this week.

got the difference between these two you

may say she has been writing many books

it's okay to say she has been writing 07:14

for many years she is a writer but to 07:19

say the number of books she has already 07:22

written referring to completed books you

need to use the present perfect she has 07:31
